

Once discovered by settlers from Europe they were seen as a delicacy and overharvested. They rebounded a bit as culinary tastes changed, but are again declining in numbers and are on the Threatened List. With the help of Sue and Don Lewis, the turtle guy of Marion, The Cove in Marion, a community at the end of Hammett's Cove, put in a terrapin nesting area to help protect their natural nesting grounds. Deborah Ewing, a cove resident and terrapin protector will speak about these amazing creatures-and the success of the 'Turtle Garden', the home of the nesting site in Hammett's Cove.
