As this is a very unusual year due to the pandemic and we are unable to get together as a group on a regular basis, we've decided to publish a summarized version of our meeting in "Ladies Choice" as a means of keeping the members up to date with what's going on in the club.

"Amended Taste of the Town," our first Fund Raising endeavor this year netted about \$1,100 for our Scholarship Fund. Some of the other Fundraising Events we are working on include:

Bulb Sale - The Garden Group is in the process of packaging daffodil bulbs to sell similar to what we did last year. They will be sold in packages of 25 for \$10.

Hathaway Painting - Brad Hathaway donated one of his wife Priscilla's paintings to our club. Priscilla was a MWC member for many years. We have formed a committee that is working on an auction to raffle the painting and any other craft items that our talented members wish to donate.


Literature Group

Joining the ranks of Hidden Figures and In the Garden of Beasts, the incredible true story of the greatest code-

breaking duo that ever lived, an American woman and her husband who invented the modern science of cryptology together and used it to confront the evils of their time, solving puzzles that unmasked Nazi spies and helped win World War II.

In 1916, at the height of World War I, brilliant Shakespeare expert Elizebeth Smith went to work for an eccentric tycoon on his estate outside Chicago. As World War II raged, Elizebeth fought a highly classified battle of wits against Hitler's Reich, cracking multiple versions of the Enigma machine used by German spies. Meanwhile, inside an Army vault in Washington, William worked furiously to break Purple, the Japanese version of Enigma—and eventually succeeded, at a terrible cost to his personal life.



Fanny Farmer Tomato Soup

1 can (35oz.) plum tomaotes

1 pint water

1 slice of yellow onion, chopped

1 bay leaf

4 whole cloves

12 peppercorns

2 teaspoons sugar

1 teaspoon salt

1/8 teaspoon baking soda

2 tablespoons butter

3 tablespoons flour

Put first 9 in gredients in pot, cook 20-30 minutes, chopping the tomatoes as your stir. Strain. In a separate pot, melt the butter, add flour and cook to make a roux. Add tomato mixture and cook, stirring until blended.

On Wednesday, September 16, three MWC members took the first inaugural "water walk" to Ram Island. These members were Sandy Herring (the original coordinator of the newly formed MWC Walking Club), Elaine Botelho (who regularly walks about 5 miles/day on dry land), and Sue Mitchell (who navigated the route from sandbar to sandbar).

Wearing old sneakers and towing a kayak (with 3 life vests tied to it), they set off from Antassawamock's Main Beach and headed into Buzzards Bay on foot. Their destination? - a little island about a half mile offshore known as Ram Island. Several Antassawamock neighbors came out to cheer them on.

At low tide, the deepest part of the walk is usually about waist deep. Given the fact that none are very tall and it was a very windy day, a few waves made the trek a little deeper - about chest deep. At this point, Sue reassured the group "this is about as deep as it will get". And yes, they did get wet and fell over a few times, but a good laugh quickly eased any anxieties.

Sandbars cover most of the sea floor en route to the island. Occasionally a few rocks or seaweed would trip them up, but overall it was walkable.

Ram Island, as you may know, is a 2 1/2 acre island located off Mattapoisett Neck. It is a bird sanctuary. The Island supports about 40% of the Mass. Roseate tern population. It is quite rocky and they were careful to stay in designated areas on the Island. The views of Buzzards Bay stretch east from the Bourne Bridge on the Cape to West Island in Fairhaven.

They stayed on the island for about 15 minutes, then ventured back before the tide started to roll in. Afterall, misjudging the tide would make the difference on whether they walked or swam the half mile back to shore. They arrived back at Main Beach, Antassawamock safe, but soaked. The entire walk took a little over an hour.

Will they do it again? Absolutely! Maybe next year you'll join them. Save those old sneakers!




2020!

What a year of challenges we've all faced - Zoom meetings, FaceTime communications, virtual hugs, meetings in the great outdoors, and more email than ever! Cindy Turse reports a recent Zoom meeting with Hawai'i friends brought a flurry of emails to and from them, serious and silly. One of the emails contained photos of our volunteer group celebrating at high tea in Kailua, HI, following the 2016 election. We weren't celebrating the results of the national election with our tea, but the huge success of statewide online voting for students K-12 in public, private, charter, and home-schools.



Voting online for all students statewide has been the focus of our small, dedicated group – "WeVoteHawaii" - for several years, and 2016 was the first year the voting reached home-schooled students. In addition to voting for state and national candidates, students voted on student submitted ballot issues specifically for their own grade levels. They were able to view and vote on a ballot that looked just like an adult ballot. Most of the schools scheduled their classes to vote in the school library during the two weeks leading up to the election. Home-schooled students and absentees could vote

by accessing a link anytime prior to Election Day. Statewide student results were posted online at 6PM on Election Day just as the real returns were being called out statewide on TV. A few student representatives were present in the state capitol building to be interviewed by the various commentators.

Is this an area where MWC could become involved? Is anyone else interested in exploring this further? It will take some effort leading to a launch two years from now, but it can be done. In Hawai'i our statewide volunteer force numbered 21, plus two tech support persons. We can start small with our state elections in two years at the elementary, junior high, and high school here. We can adapt most of the documents needed from those in my files, so none of them need to be created from scratch. The tech support should be available at ORR and the town level.

Elections happen every two years! We have an opportunity to make civics lessons real and in the process create habits that will continue, as students become responsible adults.
