Morgan Browning, BA/BS, is a Community Residence Counselor at the Child and Adolescent OCD Institute (OCDI Jr.) at McLean Hospital. She is a first year graduate student in University of Massachusetts Dartmouth's Masters of Research Psychology program, with interests in OCD, anxiety, acceptance and commitment therapy (ACT), and young adult risk behavior.



Caitlin White, LICSW, is a Senior Clinical Social Worker at the Child and Adolescent OCD Institute (OCDI Jr.) at McLean Hospital, where she conducts individual, family, and group therapy using acceptance and commitment therapy (ACT) and exposure and response prevention (ERP). She has additional extensive training in dialectical behavioral therapy (DBT).

Christmas Wreath and Greens Pop-Up: We are excited to announce the date of our **Mattapoisett Woman's Club Christmas Wreath and Greens Sale: Saturday, December 5th.** We have many opportunities for everyone in the club to participate in! Right now we are looking for donations of goods that will help us decorate the wreaths and arrangements that we make. Here is a list of ideas:

Ribbon. From the thick #40 that we make wreath bows with to the thin sizes that we can decorate boxwood trees with, all Christmas ribbon can be used. Premade bows in good condition.

Picks. Those plastic and artificial decorations that once embellished the wreaths that you bought.

Ornaments. The small ones are what we can most often use, but an occasional special one that perhaps is something special to Mattapoisett like a Salty ornament can become a theme for a special wreath.

Containers. This is a wide category. They might be Christmas mugs, clear glass bowls or white containers, especially small ones, or the special larger container that would look good with Christmas greens arranged in. Even a solo candlestick can be made into an arrangement by our talented designers. Here is where you can look beyond the actual Christmas themed items and clean out your cellar or cabinets where you might find containers that are neutral in color and which we can use.

Natural materials. Pine cones, shells, pods and pretty sticks. Go collecting and see what you can find in nature. We'll decide if we want to paint or glitter them once we get them.

Other supplies. Do you have cans of holiday spray paint, floral wire, floral tape or oasis? Let us know what you have and we'll tell you if we can use it.

Finally, if you have evergreens on your property that the Garden Group can carefully prune to use in making the centerpieces and decorating around town, please let us know if we can walk your property with you to learn what we can prune.

Erin Burlinson will have donation bins set up in her driveway, 26 North Street, beginning October 1st. Please feel free to drop them off at anytime. 
Literature Group

Hetty "Handful" Grimke, an urban slave in early nineteenth century Charleston, yearns for life beyond the suffocating walls that enclose her within the wealthy Grimke household. The Grimke's daughter, Sarah, has known from an early age she is meant to do something large in the world, but she is hemmed in by the limits imposed on women.

Kidd's sweeping novel is set in motion on Sarah's eleventh birthday, when she is given ownership of ten year old Handful, who is to be her handmaid. We follow their remarkable journeys over the next thirty five years, as both strive for a life of their own, dramatically shaping each other's destinies and forming a complex relationship marked by guilt, defiance, estrangement and the uneasy ways of love.

As the stories build to a riveting climax, Handful will endure loss and sorrow, finding courage and a sense of self in the process. Sarah will experience crushed hopes, betrayal, unrequited love, and ostracism before leaving Charleston to find her place alongside her fearless younger sister, Angelina, as one of the early pioneers in the abolition and women's rights movements.

Inspired by the historical figure of Sarah Grimke, Kidd goes beyond the record to flesh out the rich interior lives of all of her characters, both real and invented, including Handful's cunning mother, Charlotte, who courts danger in her search for something better.

This exquisitely written novel is a triumph of storytelling that looks with unswerving eyes at a devastating wound in American history, through women whose struggles for liberation, empowerment, and expression will leave no reader unmoved.


