

As I start to think about our first Ladies Choice of 2021, something came to mind that helped me look at our current moment in time. I always had an interest in mythology. In Roman Mythology, they had Janus, who was the god of beginnings and transitions and celebrated at the time when they were saying good-bye to the old year and welcoming in the new year. This year I seem to be more aware of the year change than ever before.

2020 was a time of sadness, loneliness, separation, and fear and I am sure that we all hope for better times in 2021. But for each of these realities, there were some remarkable things happening as well. We saw this in our first responders and health care workers. But what was also very impressive was the creativity we observed and were part of in our local community. Our Mattapoisett Woman's Club modeled the positive and creative changes needed. Members who lead our group activitiesworked to connect to those with whom they shared these activities. Bridge groups met in safe outdoor venues. Knitting groups met at Ned's Point with members of the Friends of the Council on Aging and later in zoom sessions. The literature group continued to read and discuss their chosen books, first outside and later on Zoom. And the Garden Group planted their usual locations throughout the town. We even developed new ways of staying connected through the weekly walking tours. But there was no Taste of the Town or Harbor Day Pie sale. This was also supposed to be a Garden Tour year, which made it a very important year for our annual scholarships, that are offered to Mattapoisett's seniors in high school as well as the other charitable Donations made to a variety of organizations in the South Coast area. So we changed and adjusted. Taste of the Town became a way for our members and others in town, to give back to local restaurants as they struggled during the pandemic, by encouraging everyone to patronize the various restaurants who supported the Taste each year. Although we did not expect any monetary gain, the restaurants gave us

Her experience and talents brought so much to the Mattapoisett Woman's Club as our largest fundraiser of 2020. Erin Burlinson and her husband generously let us use their beautiful barn to work in for over a week. Susan Perkins was another very talented designer who taught us how to make tin cans covered in bark into beautiful woodland arrangements. Sue Mitchell, as our Treasurer, arranged for us to be able to take credit cards at the event and into future events of the Mattapoisett Woman's Club. Kathy McAuliffe successfully did the Press Releases and Publicity. I did the scheduling and communications to the club, and Cindy Turse did the Facebook notices. In addition to this core organizing group, so many others in the Mattapoisett Woman's Club cut greens, made arraangements, decorated wreaths, donated items of their own and from Gifts to Give, worked at the Pop-Up event and helped clean up afterwards. And most importantly, we all did it safely during this crazy year.


Literature Group

"As we go about our daily lives, caste is the wordless usher in a darkened theater, flashlight cast down in the aisles, guiding us to our assigned seats for a performance. The hierarchy of caste is not about feelings or morality. It is about power—which groups have it and which do not."

In this brilliant book, Isabel Wilkerson gives us a masterful portrait of an unseen phenomenon in America as she explores, through an immersive, deeply researched narrative and stories about real people, how America today and throughout its history has been shaped by a hidden caste system, a rigid hierarchy of human rankings.

Beyond race, class, or other factors, there is a powerful caste system that influences people's lives and behavior and the nation's fate. Linking the caste systems of America, India, and Nazi Germany, Wilkerson explores eight pillars that underlie caste systems across civilizations, including divine will, bloodlines, stigma, and more. Using riveting stories about people—including Martin Luther King, Jr., baseball's Satchel Paige, a single father and his toddler son, Wilkerson herself, and many others—she shows the ways that the insidious undertow of caste is experienced every day. She documents how the Nazis studied the racial systems in America to plan their out-cast of the Jews; she discusses why the cruel logic of caste requires that there be a bottom rung for those in the middle to measure themselves against; she writes about the surprising health costs of caste, in depression and life expectancy, and the effects of this hierarchy on our culture and politics. Finally, she points forward to ways America can move beyond the artificial and destructive separations of human divisions, toward hope in our common humanity.

Beautifully written, original, and revealing, Caste: The Origins of Our Discontents is an eye-opening story of people and history, and a reexamination of what lies under the surface of ordinary lives and of American life today.




December 10th Mattapoisett Woman's Club Executive Board Meeting Summary

As this is a very unusual year due to the pandemic and we are unable to get together as a group on a regular basis, we've decided to publish a summarized version of our meeting in "Ladies Choice" as a means of keeping the members up to date with what's going on in the club.





Back Door Hikes and More: The Benefits and Beauty of SouthCoast Trails

All exercise is good for us. But hiking involves something many other forms of exercise do not: trails.

Hiking requires navigating in a world that is not totally predictable. Slippery dirt, leaves, overhanging branches and hidden obstacles, trail markers, rocks and boards that assist negotiating streams and wild animals crossing one's path—all of the things you might encounter on trails at historic Horseshoe Mill in Wareham or East Over Reservation with sprawling fields, sturdy stone walls, and golden yellow barns, or the tight winding paths of the Delano Memorial Forest in Rochester—all might require micro- and macro-adjustments to your route, which is good for your brain.

The act of hiking over varying terrain uses muscles in different ways not associated with simply walking around the neighborhood. There is something about separating oneself for a time from the man-made parts of society into the wilds of nature that does something to your inner spirit.





From the Kitchen of Chef Colby



Serves 8

INGREDIENTS

1 pound prepared pizza dough

8 ounces slices prosciutto cut in half width-wise

2 tbls olive oil

Black pepper

1/2 cup grated parmesan cheese

8 ounces marinara

METHOD OF PREPARATION

- 1. Preheat oven to 400°F Grease a baking sheet with nonstick spray.
- 2. Divide the pizza dough into 16 even pieces then roll into ball
- 3. Take a piece of prosciutto and wrap it around a dough ball. Gather the excess at the base of the ball and put that side down on the baking sheet so the meat stays in place.
- 4. Brush each ball with olive oil, then garnish with a sprinkle of pepper and 1 tsp of parmesan.
- 5. Bake until the proscuitto is golden and crisp and any exposed dough is golden. 15 to 17 minutes. Cool 5 minutes before serving.
- 6. Heat sauce and serve with bites

Makes 24 cookies

INGREDIENTS

1 Devils food cake mix box

1/2 cup vegetable oil

2 eggs

1 cup chocolate chips

METHOD OF PREPARATION

- 1. Grease cookie sheet. Heat oven to 350°F.
- 2. Mix cake mix, oil, eggs, and chocolate chips.
- 3. Roll cookie mix into 1 inch balls.
- 4. Place on cookie sheet. Use two sheets for the cookies, 12 on each spaced apart.
- 5. Bake for 10 minutes, remove and cool cookies.
- 6. Enjoy!
