Literature Group Book Review

Eight of us gathered via Zoom to discuss "Afterlife" by Julia Alvarez. Although it's a short novel, it is full of meaning and gave us a lot to talk about. The main character Antonia, a recently retired English professor in rural Vermont, is reeling from the sudden death of her husband when she is confronted with one crisis when her sister goes missing and another crisis when a pregnant undocumented teenager shows



up at her house. She struggles to find a balance between the emotional safety of keeping her distance and the urge to open her heart to help. Alvarez describes her novel as a story about "how do we survive the worst that can happen to us - with humor, generosity, love and hope."

Many of the particulars of the novel are drawn from Alvarez' real life. Like Antonia, she is originally from the Dominican Republic, is the second of four sisters, and lives in Vermont. We compared our experiences of sisterhood and small town life with the novel's. We discussed her portrayal of mental illness, grief, "invisible people" (or "essential workers" in pandemic jargon) and kintsugi (Japanese art of repairing broken objects with gold). We appreciated how as Antonia navigated her new life, she used literature, especially this quotation from Tolstoy: What is the right thing to do? We all thoroughly enjoyed the book!



Mattapoisett Woman's Club February meeting with Neil Rhein of Keep Mass Beautiful

On February 18th the Woman's club held it's first all club Zoom meeting. It featured Neil Rhein, the founder and executive director of Keep Mass Beautiful. Neil talked and answered our questions about what we each can do to better recycle, reuse the things that we already have, and how we can reduce our footprints left on the world. His talk was very informative and the Garden Group



will be discussing what we want to do in the future during our March 3rd meeting. All are welcome to join us so please read the writeup under the Garden Group in this issue of Ladies Choice.

Some of the take aways from Neil's talk are listed here:

- When you don't know if an item is recyclable, dispose of it in the trash rather than the recycling bin. Better yet, go to recyclesmartma.org and find out whether the item should be recycled.
- Plastic bags are not recyclable. Neil suggests that we collect all clean bags and packaging, such as the plastic wraps around the toilet paper packages and other packaging such as bread bags and plastic bags in newspaper deliveries and return them to the bins located at supermarkets.
- Small plastic caps are NOT recyclable. However, if the metal or plastic cap can be screwed onto the bottle, then it can go into the recycling bin.
- Wine bottles but not the corks are recyclable.

Neil's organization does a lot more than give talks. They assist communities in organizing a clean up day and even starting new programs such as curbside composting. Perhaps we can sponsor a cleanup day for our lovely town.

Did you know?



The Mattapoisett Woman's Club has always been involved in giving scholarships to students, but did you know the first scholarship given by our local club was \$5 given to a Mattapoisett student at Center School in 1943? Remember, Mattapoisett had one school which served grades 1-9. The club became the Mattapoisett Woman's Club in the fall of 1941 and immediately began to meet its objectives of Educational, Philanthropic,

Civic and Social. When we belonged to the State Federation of Woman's Clubs we donated money to the state-wide scholarships for Music and Drama. We also gave contributions to national scholarship programs when we belonged to the General Federation of Woman's Clubs. But back to that start of \$5. By 1948, it had already increased to \$100 and has grown to this year, in 2021, to two scholarships of \$2,500 and one for continuing education of \$1,000. Over the years we have given away more that \$100,000. How have we done this? With dedicated members who have worked diligently to raise the money through fund raising events. In the '50's, money was raised with an Annual Scholarship Ball. Then that evolved into Style Shows, Quilt sales, Rummage Sales and even a Gong Show. The town residents have always supported the Club in all these endeavers and centique to support our work mainly through The

ors and continue to support our work mainly through The Garden Tour, The Taste of the Town and even our Pie Sale. This "not normal" year we still have been able to raise money by a revised Taste of the Town, selling Bulbs, and a magnificent Wreath Sale. As this year continues and we have our Garden Tour in June, we are ensuring that this educational endeavor for our children continues. This is a goal always worthy of our efforts. Hats off to all the members who have served on the Scholarship Committee for close to 80 years. Kudos to the current three members who are hard at work selecting the recipients this year from the graduating Seniors of 2021.

- 2. I have realized that I am not "Atlas".


 The world does not rest on my shoulders.
