WHAT I DID DURING THE SUMMER PANDEMIC

After being quarantined for months, I made the best of summer 2020 enjoying various activities, but the constant threat of contracting or spreading COVID-19 loomed large. The virus is not gone, and I considered the three safety guidelines listed below before venturing out.

How many people will be there? Can one keep at least 6 feet away from other people? Will everyone be wearing masks?

With those simple precautions, I ventured boldly out my door for a 2.5 to 3 mile walk at sunrise every morning. It was a great way to stay active, and it was the coolest and quietest part of the day. The solitude was amazing en-

abling one to enjoy the fragrance and beauty of so many delightful flowers, watching rabbits, squirrels, chipmunks, bees, and butterflies going about their daily activities and identifying birds through their melodic song.

Staying physically active is one of the best things one can do for their mental health. With that said, I chose to visit less popular outdoor areas this summer, one of them being the Allens Pond Wildlife Sanctuary in Westport.

Allens Pond spans hundreds of acres of protected beach, fields, woodlands, pond, and marsh land, and extensive trail systems that offer ocean and pond views from many vantage points. I used binoculars to scan the saltmarsh for saltmarsh sparrows, herons, and camouflaged shorebirds. Also, the robust red cedar, bayberry, beach plum, and shadbush are all native plants that thrive in this sandy coastal habitat.

On a subsequent trip, the day was devoted to beach-nesting bird species, including the Piping Plover, American Oystercatcher, and Least Tern. These birds lay eggs directly on the sand, and since their eggs and chicks blend near-perfectly into the bleached terrain, it is difficult to spot them.

But none-the-less, I spotted them and was immediately struck by how peaceful it was and how quickly the birds settled down, and the amazing things I would see soon after: Chicks running to the water just inches away; adults moving their broods back and forth right in front of me; courtships and copulations so close I had to turn my head in modesty. Interestingly, the behavior of the colony is drastically different when they believe that no one is observing or photographing the chaos.

Notwithstanding the coronavirus, it was a delightful summer.




Literature Group

Larry McMurtry, in books like The Last Picture Show, has depicted the modern degeneration of the myth of the American West. The subject of Lonesome Dove, cowboys herding cattle on a great trail-drive, seems like the very stuff of that cliched myth, but McMurtry bravely tackles the task of creating meaningful literature out of it. At first the novel seems the kind of anti-mythic, anti-heroic story one might expect: the main protagonists are a drunken and inarticulate pair of former Texas Rangers turned horse rustlers. Yet when the trail begins, the story picks up an energy and a drive that makes heroes of these men. Their mission may be historically insignificant, or pointless--McMurtry is smart enough to address both possibilities--but there is an undoubted valor in their lives. The result is a historically aware, intelligent, romantic novel of the mythic west that won the 1986 Pulitzer Prize for fiction.

Our "Taste of the Town Without the Tent" fundraiser has raised \$1,135.00

to date. Special thanks go to Lois Ennis for organizing this event. In addition to raising money for our scholarship fund, we have also been able to give back to our local Mattapoisett restaurants by frequenting a different restaurant each week.

Despite limited fundraising this year, we were able to pay our scholarship recipients a total of \$8,500 in August. Three scholarships of \$2,500. each were paid to High School graduates Lauren LaPointe, Meghan McCullough, and Ryan Picewick. One scholarship of \$1,000 was paid to Morgan Browning, a returning student. We wish them all well.


We also were able to "beautify the town" thanks to members of the MWC and Garden Group.

We donated \$517.91 and purchased summer plants for the Post Office window boxes, Historical Museum, Library, and Town Hall.




Ladies, we can't let this fall season pass without two things – exercising the right to vote that we women secured 100 years ago and getting a flu shot.
