Secure Passwords

Bottom Line Up Front

- Don't use the same password for all your accounts.
- Weak or unprotected passwords continue to be a top cause of security breaches.
- Use two-factor authentication for an extra layer of protection.
- Consider a password manager to help you maintain security

Scammer and hacker attacks continue to have damaging effects on consumers and businesses. One thing that's clear is that their getting



access to passwords is still a top cause of these security breaches. The good news is that having a strong password can be the first step in outsmarting the bad guys and minimizing your risk.

Create Unique Usernames and Passwords

Most of us sign in to multiple websites—for both business and personal needs—which makes it challenging to remember the usernames and passwords for each one. While some people think a solution is to use the same one for all their accounts, that's unwise. It's important to have a different username and password for every account you have. Why? One reason is, if one is breached, all others are at risk.

Check Your Passwords' Strength

Many websites will measure the strength of your password at the time you create it.

Increase Your Current Passwords' Strength

If you determine your current passwords aren't strong enough, it's simple enough to change them.

Some tips for increasing password strength include:

Username

- Create a username between 6 and 32 characters
- Include at least one letter and one number
- Don't use part of your email address, Social Security Number, birthday, account or access numbers

Password

- Create a password between 8 and 32 characters
- Include at least one number, at least one letter, at least one capital letter and at least one special character (e.g., %, &, #)

• Consider using a mnemonic sentence—the longer, the better (e.g., "My loving but crazy friend Kate has over 12 cats." could become "MlbcfKho12c"). It looks random, but it's easier to remember. Then, for added security, replace some letters with numbers and/or special characters (e.g., M1bcfKh012c!).

Don't use these for your password:

- Part of your email address
- Social Security Number
- Birthday
- Pet name
- · Family names
- Account or access numbers
- Dictionary words (Lots of people still use "password." It's the easiest to hack.)

Keep in mind that longer usernames and passwords are far more difficult to crack.

Use Two-Factor Authentication

More and more apps and sites offer two-factor authentication (2FA). It's an extra layer of security that double-checks your identity before giving access to your account. Most often, 2FA will require a password plus another form of identification, such as a unique code sent by text.

Safeguard Your Passwords

Two final and very important points regarding strong passwords and security. Never Share Your Password or 2FA Code. Believe it or not, some people do share their passwords, either on purpose or accidentally. In fact, a survey of IT and security managers conducted by Enterprise Management Associates (EMA) revealed that nearly a third of respondents said they experienced a breach because users shared credentials with an unauthorized person. Another 28 percent said they had a breach when users shared information in a phishing attack.

Be aware, fraudsters have begun trying to trick people into giving out 2FA codes by impersonating their financial institutions. Never give the code to someone who calls and asks you for it.

Don't Store Passwords on Electronic Devices. If you store personal information on electronic devices, especially passwords and account sign-in details or financial data, you've increased your risk if your device is lost or stolen. That information can be used by anyone in possession of the device to gain access to your accounts. Instead of storing them on electronic devices, find a more secure way to save the information like writing them down and storing them in a lock box or using a password manager.


Password managers, like LastPass and 1Password, can help you keep track of your passwords, but there are pros and cons. For example, although you'd no longer need to remember multiple user names and passwords, you'd still need to remember the username and password to that site. Plus, if the site were to be breached by hackers, it would open all your accounts to them. Before you decide whether one would work for you, do a little research on their security and compare features, benefits and cost.

Stop Scams. Learn the Signs.

Learning to spot a scam is the best way to prevent yourself from becoming a victim.

EVERSOURCE will never demand immediate payment to prevent shutoff, never require you to use prepaid debit cards, or ask you to pay through another retailer. If someone asks for your personal information to provide a refund or demands payment for a new meter – you can be sure it isn't us.

Here are some different types of scammers that target Eversource customers, with more examples available on their website:



Shut-Off Scammers pose as utility employees and threaten to disconnect service unless you make an immediate payment through prepaid debit cards, gift cards, bitcoin or payment apps. They may even manipulate the caller ID to make it appear the call is coming from Eversource. You may hear from Eversource if you get behind on your bill, but it won't be to demand immediate payment in an unusual method. Instead, Eversource can connect you to programs to help you catch up.

Overpayment Scammers call claiming that you overpaid your utility bill then try to get your personal bank account or credit card information to give you a "refund." In reality, any accidental overpayment would be credited to your next Eversource bill or refunded via check.

Phony Fee for Equipment or Repair Scammers call demanding a separate payment to replace or install a device or meter.

If you find yourself on the receiving end of any of these types of calls, hang up and call your local police department immediately.


Literature Group

Drawing on her life as an indigenous scientist, and as a woman, Kimmerer shows how other living beings—asters

and goldenrod, strawberries and squash, salamanders, algae, and sweetgrass—offer us gifts and lessons, even if we've forgotten how to hear their voices. In reflections that range from the creation of Turtle Island to the forces that threaten its flourishing today, she circles toward a central argument: that the awakening of ecological consciousness requires the acknowledgment and celebration of our reciprocal relationship with the rest of the living world. For only when we can hear the languages of other beings will we be capable of understanding the generosity of the earth, and learn to give our own gifts in return.

Literature Group Book Review

The Literature Group met via Zoom on March 10 to discuss First: Sandra Day O'Connor by Evan Thomas. At nearly 500 pages, it is a well researched and thorough biography of the first female member of the Supreme Court from her childhood on an Arizona cattle ranch to her post-retirement life. Noting that she was born in 1930 and graduated from Stanford Law School in 1952, we agreed that her achievements were that much more extraordinary at a time when no law firm would hire a woman. We discussed how her



upbringing, her personality, and her supportive husband as well as her ability, contributed to her success. Some of us found the volume of details about her judicial career and the machinations of state and federal politics more or less interesting and we differed on how we saw her judicial legacy. We realized how far women have come since O'Connor's appointment to the Supreme Court forty years ago.


Knitting, Crocheting, Needlepoint and More!

Did you know?




In 1985 and 1986, the Mattapoisett Woman's Club published their recipes in "Doorways to Dining" a 146 page cookbook to fund the scholarships. It was extremely popular and was featured in Yankee Magazine as the "Cookbook of the Month" Over 2,500 copies were sold locally, nationally and even internationally. The recipes are separated into sections from appetizers to potpourri. There is even a section devoted to restaurants such as Brad's, Branigan's, Cathy Temple, Joseph's Olde Tavern, Mattapoisett Chowder House, Mattapoisett Diner and the Mattapoisett Inn. Each section has a drawing of the historic doors in the village. They may be elegant, stately, or austere, but always beautiful. 
