#### Special April Luncheon Presentation: Sheryl Faye as Ruth Bader Ginsberg

Our April luncheon meeting will feature a special program presentation by Sheryl Faye. The article below is directly from her website. Our program will begin promptly at 11:15 so please be early.

#### **RUTH BADER GINSBURG - "I DISSENT"**

Ruth Bader Ginsburg was an American lawyer and jurist who served as an associate justice of the Supreme Court of the United States from 1993 until her death in September 2020. She was the second woman and the first Jewish woman ever appointed to the Court and became the longest serving Jewish Justice.

She championed fairness and equality and objected to different expectations for men and women, prejudice against minority groups in places like hotels and restaurants, and women having fewer job opportunities than men. Ruth served on the national board of the ACLU (American Civil Liberties Union) and launched The Women's Rights Project, she continued to be a leading voice for gender equality, women's interests, and civil rights and liberties.

Ruth Bader Ginsburg's life continues to be one of achievement: as a lawyer, professor of law, a judge, and then a Supreme Court justice, she stands out because she was not afraid to dissent, disapprove, and disagree with conditions of unfairness and inequality. This show is the inspiring story of how she changed her life—and ours.

#### Lace, Justice, and Ruth - What do these all have in common?

They are memories of Ruth Bader Ginsburg, US Supreme Court Justice from 1993 to 2020.

To celebrate our upcoming performance by Sheryl Faye portraying Ruth Bader Ginsburg on April 20, we have ordered lace collars which we plan to sell for \$5.00 each.

Ginsburg (or "RBG" as she is well known) wore a lace collar as part of her judicial robe. She and Sandra Day O'Connor decided that if men could have an official wardrobe for the court such as a shirt and tie worn under their robes,



then women should also have a look of their own. To feminize the robe, she chose a lace collar and was known for her various collars throughout her career.

#### Daffodil Daze: Some Fun for Spring Break Week

Beginning Tuesday, April 19, families can pick up a map of pictures showing where daffodil groupings bloom that have been planted around town by the garden group the last few years. At each location around town there will be a numbered sign in the shape of a daffodil flower head that is visible from a car or, where possible, visible while walking (such as at the wharf). The goal will be to put the correct number next to the picture and location on the map. When the map is complete, it can be turned in to the children's library staff for a "prize" (packaged make-at home, simple craft). Thursday, Friday and Saturday of that week there will be a table set aside in the Children's section where one or two daffodil projects can be done (glue, construction paper, crayons, etc.) The library will also have a display of gardening/flower/daffodil books.



MATTAPOISETT — A sea of blue and yellow decorates the window boxes at the Mattapoisett Post Office in a show of support for the people of Ukraine, thanks to an effort by the Mattapoisett Woman's Club.

The window box design, which also features sunflowers, was created by club member Sharon Doyan.

The flags were planted Friday, March 18 by the club members, who reported that passersby expressed thanks for the effort. At the club luncheon on March 17, club members donated \$500 to World Central Kitchen for Ukraine.

The organization feeds refugees as they cross the border into Poland, Moldova, Romania, and Hungary. World Central Kitchen has also taken food and supplies to Odessa.

#### Caroline Marcoux's Bok Choy Salad ~ A Hit at March Luncheon Meeting!

All mixes can be prepared in advance; if so, put Mixes 1 and 3 in fridge; leave Mix 2 at room temperature.

#### Mix 1:

2 Tbsp. soy sauce ¼ cup rice vinegar ½ cup sugar ¾ cup canola oil

Boil together exactly one minute while stirring. Let cool. If mixture becomes too thick before adding to other mixes, microwave for about 10 seconds.

#### Mix 2:

2 pkgs ramen noodles (Crunch with mallet before opening packages.)

½ cup rounded sliced almonds ¼ cup sesame seeds 2 ½ Tbsp canola oil Pinch of garlic powder and salt

Toast first 2 ingredients with oil, then add sesame seeds for short time at end. Saute all until brown.

#### Mix 3:

Medium head bok choy cut to bite-sized pieces

Assemble all mixes in serving bowl.
