
We meet on the second Wednesday of the month from September through May at the homes of members who volunteer to host the meetings.

A remarkable novel about J. P. Morgan's personal librarian, Belle da Costa Greene, the Black American woman who was forced to hide her true identity and pass as white in order to leave a lasting legacy that enriched our nation, from New York Times bestselling authors Marie Benedict and Victoria Christopher Murray.

In her twenties, Belle da Costa Greene is hired by J. P. Morgan to curate a collection of rare manuscripts, books, and artwork for his newly built Pierpont Morgan Library. Belle becomes a fixture in New York City society and one of the most powerful people in the art and book world, known for her impeccable taste and shrewd negotiating for critical works as she helps create a world-class collection.

But Belle has a secret, one she must protect at all costs. She was born not Belle da Costa Greene but Belle Marion Greener. She is the daughter of Richard Greener, the first Black graduate of Harvard and a well-known advocate for equality. Belle's complexion isn't dark because of her alleged Portuguese heritage that lets her pass as white—her complexion is dark because she is African American.

The Personal Librarian tells the story of an extraordinary woman, famous for her intellect, style, and wit, and shares the lengths she must go to—for the protection of her family and her legacy—to preserve her carefully crafted white identity in the racist world in which she lives.

The Town of Mattapoisett is more beautiful each year because of the Mattapoisett Woman's Club Garden Group and its many dedicated volunteers. Our volunteers plan, design, purchase, prune, and

water at several locations around town. Each season brings new plantings in the window boxes at the Post Office and the barrels and urns the library. at During the summer season, our



gardeners fill the window boxes at the Town Beach House, plant new plants in the logo garden at the Town Wharf, and fill the urns at Town Hall. Kudos and thanks to Sharon Doyon, Susan Perkins, and Elaine Botelho for the designs and implementation; and lots of hand-clapping for all of the volunteers who weed and water.

You'll see many of our pink-vested volunteers around town diligently watering the public plantings.

Our first meeting of the "year" will be in-person in the Library Community Room, September 7th, 10:00 AM. MWC members who wish to join the Garden Group are always welcome at our meetings and activities! Dues for the GG are \$10/year.







Springtime daffodils bloom around town in both public and private gardens due to the efforts of the group's members. The Daffodil Project started with the purchase of 1,000 King Alfred daffodil bulbs in 2019. These naturalizing bulbs were planted at: Memorial Rock (Aucoot Road and Route 6); the intersection of Route 6 and Church Street; around the flagpole at the library; in several garden areas at the Town Hall; the Welcome Sign at the entrance to Industrial Park on North Street; the triangle east of the Oxford Creamery; in front of the Lions' information board at Route 6 and North Street; and finally, the traffic island *Continued on page 9*

at the intersection of River Road and Acushnet Road. Most recently, bulbs were planted at the entrance to Village Court on Acushnet Road. In 2021, 4,000 bulbs were purchased, packaged and sold for the highly successful Daffodil Scholarship Fundraiser. Some of the bulbs were also planted at the locations listed above.

Again, this year, the "Pistil Packin' Mommas" will gather to package for sale an undisclosed number of bulbs. Sue Hovasse, at Pen and Pendulum, will sell them in her store where she also stocks our Club's notecards. Plans for other sales include the possibility of a pop-up in a convenient location for our community, plus member and online sales.

The Christmas Greens and Wreath Sale will continue this year! The date is set for December 3rd. Specific details will follow next month.

Knitting, Crocheting, Needlepoint and More! Thursday, September 22, 2:00 pm - 4:00 pm



Quarantining in Paris

What started as an 8-day leisure cruise along the Seine River in France turned into an additional 7 day "extension in isolation" for my Mom (Marianne Mattison) and me. Of course, we were fully vaxed and boosted and eager to use a travel credit from a 2020 cruise that had been cancelled due to the pandemic.

The first 6 days were delightful — great food, great sites in Paris, Versailles, Monet Gardens, country villages, castles, D-day beaches of Normandy. However, things changed dramatically on Day 7 when my Mom tested positive for Covid. Fortunately,



her symptoms were mild... BUT the fun stopped immediately. We stayed in our cabin until arrangements could be made to transfer us to a Paris hotel. Fully masked, we left the ship that afternoon. We began quarantining at the hotel and were instructed to place a "Do Not Disturb" sign on our door. We were not allowed to leave unless going to a doctor or "pharmacie". Our meals were delivered in a paper bag and left outside our door. No one was allowed to enter.

Days went by slowly. At times we watched TV in French just for something to do. We tried to have a "plan" each day to give us something to think about or solve. We discussed living arrangements for Mom, how to re-do our living room at home, financial plans, etc.

It wasn't all that bad though. In fact, July 14 was really fun. It was Bastille Day in France and although we were not allowed to join in any festivities, we saw them on French TV. We watched a huge military parade march down the Champs-Elysees. We saw President Macron deliver a speech (in French, of course). And we saw the actual streaks from the jets that did a flyover the city.

Later that day, we watched cyclists in the Tour de France race through the French Alps. The evening was topped off with a terrific outdoor band concert in the park. At 11 pm, we watched the most impressive fireworks display I have ever seen shot from the Eiffel Tower.

Had we not "involuntarily extended" our trip - we would have missed it. (I think this was a preview for the upcoming 2024 summer Olympics which will be held in Paris.)

Would we do it again? Not sure.....but it does give us a story to tell. C'est la vie!
