
# **Literature Group**

## **Great Decisions**

#### Wednesdays 1:00pm - 3:00pm until March 8, 2023

This year is a banner year for interest and registration for The Great Decisions Program. We have members representing Mattapoisett and Marion and many outlying areas: from Acushnet, Buzzards Bay, New Bedford, Rochester, South Dartmouth, Wareham, even Bedford, MA. Each week this diverse group adds vibrant conversations to the topics during our discussions.

So far we have covered "Energy Geopolitics," "War Crimes (including Ukraine)" and "China and the U.S.," with a member chosen to lead the discussion with their synopsis of the chapter and any other outside readings they have discovered to share. Every person has an opportunity to speak; we allow three minutes per person. Group members offer diverse backgrounds, from educators to engineers, foreign service representatives, a pilot, and many

well-traveled, extremely intelligent individuals. We are very fortunate to have such an energetic and enthusiastic quality group.

Topics to be covered are "Economic Warfare," "Politics in Latin America," "Global Famine," "Iran at a Crossroads," and "Climate Migration." We hope to have a guest speaker from Woodwell Climate Research Center (formerly Woods Hole Research Center, located in Woods Hole, MA.)


There are two ways to attend: either in person at the Mattapoisett Free Public Library or the Zoom platform. Jennifer Jones, Library Director, collaborates with us each week to provide the

viewing of the 25-minute video film which corresponds with each topic, and the Zoom platform which consists of high technology with an immersive hybrid meeting with a 360-degree camera called an Owl, allowing all people to view each other on the screen. Jennifer and her helpful staff assist with any materials for each topic, room availability and any questions or concerns.

MWC member Marianne Hickey has been a fabulous help in offering the refreshments to share with the group each week.

As you can see, we are in progress, and our MWC program offers a first-rate eight-week, two hours per week Educational and Community service covering Foreign Policy and International Relations. We work toward the goals of reaching informed decisions and having the opportunity to express opinions regarding the topics in our text, along with outside research.

Although MWC Great Decisions was started in the 1970s by Bobbie Ketchel and a handful of members, we have managed to run consecutively even during Covid, and I have enjoyed the pleasure of facilitating this program as Chair and Moderator since 2006.
