HOW DID I GET TO THE MWC?

My name is Gail Roberts, the new Historian for the Woman's Club. I was asked to introduce myself for the March newsletter.

I grew up in Mattapoisett, and went to Center School, and Old Rochester Regional High School (Class of 1972). My mother, Marion Roberts, and my grandmother, Minnie Tinkham, were members of the Woman's Club, so it seemed natural to me to join after I retired.

Growing up in Mattapoisett was both fun and claustrophobic. The fun was from my friends, riding my bike around town (mostly to the



library), and sailing with my brother or with friends. As I became a teenager, it was claustrophobic because, being the grandchild of Minnie Tinkham meant that everyone knew my business, and that I could get away with nothing. After I received my Bachelor's degree from Southeastern Mass. University (now UMass Dartmouth), I moved to the Big City: Philadelphia. I earned my Master's degree in Library Science from Drexel University, then went to work for the Free Library of Philadelphia as a Children's Librarian. The one problem with living in the Big City was that no one knew my business! I made many friends there, both from the folk scene and the library world. I am still in contact with several of my Philly friends. I moved back to Massa-chusetts in 1982, working as Children's Librarian in the Brookline Public Library. In 1984, I married Rob Price (ORR Class of 1974), and we moved to my grandmother's house in the Tinkhamtown section of Mattapoisett. In 1985, we welcomed our daughter, Charlotte (ORR Class of 2004), who is the 7th generation of my mother's family to live in our house. By then, I was working as Children's Librarian at the Elizabeth Taber Library in Marion, a much shorter commute, and right next door to my daughter's preschool at Sippican School. In 1988, I became Children's Librarian at the New Bedford Free Public Library, and, in 2006, became the Director of the Joseph H. Plumb Memorial Library in Rochester. I retired in 2022.

My hobbies are knitting, playing the piano (which I started doing at age 12; I'd be a better player if I actually practiced!); fixing things in my drafty 200+ -year old house; hiking around Cold River Camp in Chatham, NH; singing in the New Bedford Harbor Sea Chanty Chorus; and reading, mainly Science Fiction. Being involved in the SF world has brought Rob and me to many places, attending SF conferences in Boston, Dublin, Kansas City, Montreal, and, (we hope) Glasgow in 2024. Ask me about the time we nearly got thrown out of a party in Montreal with George R. R. Martin ("Game of Thrones" author), or about having fish and chips with Jane Yolen at her summer place in St. Andrews, Scotland. Or how we became part of a Netflix series "Love, Death, and Robots" thanks to our dear friend, author Michael Swanwick. We are a family of librarians (me, my daughter at Carnegie Mellon, a cousin-in-law at Elizabeth Taber Library) and musicians (me, my brother Mark, my sister-in-law, my daughter, my son-in-law, a cousin, my nephew). With our first grandchild expected to arrive in mid-June, we are looking at a new chapter in our lives.
