



Due to a late start in October, our bridge games will continue into May. Carolyn Price will host on May 9th and Jackie Slade on May 23rd.



The Mattapoisett Free Public Library's Sustainability Partnership is providing opportunities for individuals and organizations to address their inner eco-consciousness and to make a tangible impact on Mattapoisett's environment. The plan is to meet at the library on Saturday, April 22, at 9 am for assignments. Clean up is from 9 am to 11 am. Please consider being a volunteer captain. The clean-up will benefit marine life and promote human health as we pick up the detritus of a consumer culture that eats away at the natural landscape and threatens the survival of our shared planet. All waste and litter collected on behalf of the Sustainability Partnership can be deposited at a specified area on the library property where it will be weighed and recorded by Board of Health Agent Gail Joseph. Mattapoisett's DPW will dispose of the collected waste.

Individuals/groups will be assigned cleanup sites or they can create their own solo or small group cleanups in their neighborhood or where they work. Please take before and after pictures, dress accordingly, and bring a reusable water bottle. Mama Mahina's Chinese Chicken Salad

As served at the MWC meeting March 16, 2023

Ingredients:

- 1 whole shredded roasted chicken *(cooked by your favorite local store)*
- 1 head of Napa cabbage sliced crosswise
- 1 bunch green onions chopped
- 1 bunch fresh cilantro leaves only, chopped
- 1 2 shredded carrots



Topping:

1 package slivered almonds

1 package somen or ramen noodles – smashed (use a rolling pin or meat tenderizer to crush the noodles in the package)

1 tsp. sesame oil

After crushing the noodles still in the packaging, discard the seasoning packet.

Brown the noodles and the almonds mixed with 1 tsp. of sesame oil in a very large frying pan.

The noodles brown more slowly than almonds, so mix the almonds in after a couple of minutes.

The browning moves quickly. I start the noodles on high and then drop the heat to medium

- stirring constantly.

Dressing:

Make 1-2 days ahead and refrigerate

1/2 C. rice vinegar

1/2 C. canola oil – 1 tsp. sesame oil

3 TBSP oyster sauce

3 TBSP sugar

salt & pepper to taste

(probably 1/2 tsp. salt and 1/3 tsp. pepper)

Before tossing the salad, I add half of the noodle mix to the salad ingredients and then add the dressing. Toss. Top the salad with the rest of the almonds and noodles before serving.

Great Decisions

The 2023 Great Decisions program which ended on March 8 posed many difficult questions and concerns about China and US relations, Iran, economic warfare, poverty, war crimes, famine and climate migration. There were weeks when many members were affected emotionally due to the subject matter. We found that discussing and researching the topics put us right into contemporary global issues such as catastrophic weather, climate change and famine.

Each week either one or two members of the group would lead the discussion. For example, for "Politics in Latin America," our Woman's Club member, Kristen McCormack in her first year joining Great Decisions, was co-leader with Ellen Stone from Marion. While teaching at Boston University at the Questrom School of Business, Kristen founded the popular Latin America Field Seminar, taking groups of MBA students annually to Brazil, Argentina and Chile to study business and economic trends and environmental sustainability in the region. So we were enlightened by her first-hand experience and knowledge of the topic. Her co-leader, Ellen Stone, who has been living in Marion for the past 36 years and retired as a Registered Investment Advisor managing investment



portfolios with a specialty in foreign debt instruments and ESG/SRI investments, was a perfect match to cover the economics and politics of the Latin American regions with Kristen.

For our last topic, "Climate change, environmental degradation and migration," we invited Dr. Karen Jacob-

sen, the author from our text. She is a world classic scholar with a Ph.D., M.I.T., 1992; SM, Political Science, M.I.T.,1988; MA, Sociology. Northeastern U., 1985; and BA, Political Science and English, University of Witwatersrand in Johannesburg, South Africa, 1979. Dr. Jacobsen is the Henry J. Leir Professor of Global Migration at the Fletcher School of Law & Diplomacy at Tufts University. By way of Zoom, she talked about her current research and project for "Refugees in Towns" in Ethiopia where she recently visited, studying urban displacement of migrants. We were delighted to have her academic leadership and professional focus on the topic.



Faithfully each week, Marianne Hickey provided the refreshments, coffee and water. Her commitment was tried and true, and well appreciated. Nancy Holland and other members offered delicious treats, too. Refreshments are an integral part of the social community and add to the camaraderie and uplifting
