

PRESIDENT'S CORNER

Dear Club Members,

I'm writing today about an issue happening in the Town of Mattapoisett that is near and dear to my heart. I invite you to a presentation about how trees will be impacted by the Town's Road Project on February 28th at the Fire Station Meeting Room at 6:00 PM.

As Chair of the Mattapoisett Tree Committee, I have been involved in a proposed road project in the Village since 2014. This project runs from Acushnet Road across Route 6 to Main Street to Water Street to Beacon Street to Marion Road and ends at Route 6 at the Oxford Creamery. It is a comprehensive plan to replace all underground utilities, repave, set new curbs and sidewalks and improve drainage. It began with a vote to fund engineering design followed by a slate of public input meetings where citizens in small groups learned about the project and voiced their concerns and the features they want to

retain. The engineers talked about the exceptions that a historic town such as ours would require to protect the village character, including our tree-lined streets, which were mentioned at many meetings.

Then the pandemic hit and transitions occurred in Town Hall. In 2022 the project resurfaced and the Tree Committee examined a new set of plans. Our concerns were many, as we saw that trees would be sacrificed for roadways and sidewalks, and no new trees were noted for planting. We drew up our own vision for the roadway, with new trees added to compensate for tree removals and tree losses due to construction damages. It attempted to create special zones enhancing pedestrian experiences, slowing traffic and adding shade cover from trees. It was presented to the Select Board but not utilized as far as we ever learned.

In the fall of 2023, the Mattapoisett Select Board used their public Selectboard meetings to have the engineers present their plans. The Tree Committee was in the audience, but was never given a set of plans to review prior to the meeting, so our understanding of the newest proposals and changes made at each meeting was limited. Our concerns were many once we received each session's revised plans. We were pleased that our Town Administrator came to the December Tree Committee meeting where the press and roughly 20 citizens attended to learn more. Most were surprised that the project was again active and to learn that many changes had been made.

It is a recognized fact by our committee that trees will be lost with this road construction. We are sponsoring a public meeting to present to our citizens our understanding of the current plans, since no project-specific public meetings have been held since 2018.

The Tree Committee meeting will be held on February 28 at 6:00 PM in the Mattapoisett Fire Station Meeting Room. Please check our <u>Friends of Mattapoisett Trees Facebook group</u> for additional information.



HOW I GOT TO THE MWC

I grew up in Rochester, NY. I've always loved digging in the dirt. One of my favorite memories is weeding in my mother's rose garden on both sides of the front door path. She had mulched with cocoa bean shells and I loved the smell when I stirred up the mulch.

Since I've been married, we've lived in New York, Illinois, Texas, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Massachusetts. In 1999 we moved to Shrewsbury, MA. As we were thinking about retiring in 2011, we decided to move near one of our children and his family and be a "destination" for our other two sons and family to visit.

The Woman's Club popped up when I talked to people at church coffee hour. I joined the Woman's Club in September 2012 and also went to a garden group



An influx of new members joined around the same time – Mary O'Keefe, Kathy Saunders, Marie Rottler, Suzanne Sylvester, Erin Burlinson, Sue Mitchell, Kathy McAuliffe and me. We all worked on the 2014 garden tour. From there we began to plant and weed at the various plantings around town. Since a group of us live on the eastern side of town, we focused on the Triangle Garden. After we lugged gallons and gallons of water to the garden, we discovered there was water at the site. We negotiated with the Town Manager and Water Dept. to have a pipe and spigot installed which made it much easier to water. We planted the perimeter with annuals but gradually moved to perennials and natives so we didn't have to water at all.

In the fall of 2019, the Woman's Club planted over 1,000 daffodil bulbs around town under the expert

leadership of Roxanne Bungert who was president. I was so disappointed when Covid spoiled the plans to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the Women's Right to Vote. But, we all celebrated spring with the daffodils that popped up everywhere around town.

Lately I've become more concerned about sustainability and environmental issues –invasives, plastics, recycling, climate change, food waste. You may have noticed the food recycling bin I brought to the January meeting or you may have heard me rant about the Mattapoisett weed – black swallow wort that is attracting monarch butterflies to lay their eggs on it which then kills the larvae because the toxin



in the leaves is too strong for them to digest. Or you may have seen me confiscate the coffee grounds for my compost.

The Woman's Club is a great place to share new ideas, learn what others in the community care about, enjoy lunch and a program and, best of all, make new friends.



No woman in the Gilded Age made as much money as Hetty Green. Native Plant Seed Starting workshop

Barb Van Inwegen and Sandy Hering, both Mattapoisett Woman's Club and Mattapoisett Land Trust members, led a Native Plant Seed Starting workshop in January for the public. Several MWC members attended, and our photographer, Ann Tisdale, attended and took the pictures!

The workshop instructed how to give a necessary cold treatment to specific varieties of native plants, as these species of plants require a cold treatment in order to germinate. We were assisted by Colleen Andrews, Manager of Mattapoisett Land Trust, who joined others and sowed seeds in recycled milk jugs which will be put outside for the remainder of the winter, and repotted after they germinate in the spring.

The Land Trust seedlings were chosen to plant at three of the Land Trust properties: Munro property by the town wharves, Dunseith Gardens at the corner of Rte. 6 and North Street, and Betsy's meadow, off Prospect Road. If you missed the program this year, we hope to have another next year.









January Luncheon

Forty four of us gathered on a clear, cold day to the warmth of Hostess Sharon Doyon's welcome to the New Year. Canned Goods and Stone Soup

Winter is a great time for soup. Open the pantry and check what canned soup and vegetables you have on hand. But...have you checked the "best by" dates or expiration dates on your canned goods lately?

How many cans of beans, chicken noodle soup, corn, etc. do you have stocked up? Do you remember what recipe they were bought for?

Here's an opportunity to use those products before they get tossed in the trash. Donate canned soup, vegetables or fruits that are getting close to their end dates and we will turn them into Stone Soup on February 29th to share with you.

You may not have read the children's book about Stone Soup. It's an old folk tale in which hungry travelers come into a town of humble peasants and together they create a warm, delicious meal that each person has contributed to. That's our goal.

Between February 5 and February 25 you can drop them off at three locations:

- 1. the Mattapoisett Free Public Library during open hours where there will be a box near the upstairs circulation desk;
- 2. the Mattapoisett COA Drop Monday-Friday 8 am —3:00 pm; or
- 3. Mattapoisett Congregational Church on Mondays and Thursdays between 9 am and noon (use the Mechanic Street door and leave them on the big wooden oval table near the kitchen).

The sustainability group will turn the canned goods into stone soup to share with you on February 29th at noon in Reynard Hall at the Congregational Church. It's part of our continuing effort to find ways to use our environment and resources wisely. In February we are focusing on reducing food waste by buying what we need, using what we have and avoiding tossing unused food in the trash.
