PRESIDENT'S CORNER

Dear Club Members,

At our February meeting we had a wonderful speaker, a Park Ranger from the Cape Cod Canal, who talked about the initiative to plant wildflowers at the visitor center and along both sides of the Cape Cod Canal. Her presentation included a video of many of the wildflowers that they have planted for a variety of seasons, soil types, and sun levels. A great presentation and very educational.

To follow up on this, I am going to write about a great "grass roots" organization that is available to us to help us improve the survival of our pollinators: the butterflies, bees, insects, and hummingbirds that pollinate our wildflowers, and cultivated trees and plants that bring us joy and food. The organization is called Pollinator-Pathways.

What began in New York on the Connecticut border is a nonprofit volunteer organization with the goal of creating plots of land planted with polli-

nator-friendly native plants which, when put together, become a 'pathway' for the pollinators to travel and thrive. The plots of land can be small postage size lots such as mine, or larger plots of conservation land, or botanical gardens or public lands. Anyone can submit their property to the organization for inclusion in their lists of properties and it's relatively simple to do: you calculate your total square footage, you list all the plants that are planted and estimate the square footage of native and pollinator-friendly plants.

Since it's beginning in 2017, the organization has grown to over 300 communities in 18 states; and since I registered my property, Cape Cod has become a large contributor to Pollinator-Pathways with 8 towns and numerous garden clubs and conservation organizations involved. Massachusetts has 12 additional towns in the program in addition to the Cape Cod group, but alas, Mattapoisett is not listed as Barb Van Inwegen and I are the only participants in our town.

There are several requirements to participate but they are simple, whether you do your own gardening or use a landscaper:

- No pesticides or chemical fertilizers should be used on lawns
- No chemical insecticides or herbicides should be used on gardens
- Invasives should be removed manually, with exceptions for the most noxious and/ or extensive, large-scale invasives.

The website, www.pollinator-pathway.org is filled with useful information of how to do this: what native plants to plant and where to buy them, and even how to talk to your neighbors about what they are using on their property. Please check it out. I'd like to see Mattapoisett get on the map and join a growing group of communities taking small steps that can yield big results. The Mattapoisett Land Trust is interested in starting to put several of their properties on the program, and perhaps some of you will do the same. 2024 can be a great year for our pollinator friends.

Mattapoisett has also given me new experiences. I can now say I'm a golfer, a tenor in my church choir, an active Town Meeting member, a contributor to the town's Master Plan, as well as a player, turned instructor, of Mah Jongg. As an avid reader, I joined a neighborhood book club, but it then dissolved. Robin Lepore, whom I had met when we worked together on the Mattapoisett Master Plan, suggested I try going with her to the MWC's Literature Group meeting. So, I attended the last book discussion of the year and joined the club on the spot, as Lois Ennis was conveniently sitting right next to me, ready to collect my dues. Even though I didn't really know anyone, I had lots of fun even before the first monthly luncheon in September...going on group walks, prepping and ticket selling for Taste of the Town, baking pies and making new friends. I've even started a new interest group for Mah Jongg. It hasn't taken long for me to feel as if I've known many of the women for much longer than it's actually been. I'm thrilled to be part of a group that has so much fun, while accomplishing so much!

I volunteered for various organizations wherever my husband and I were stationed during 27 itinerant years of moving with the Marine Corps.

When I retired (final retirement 2016), I made a series of five-year plans for volunteering. The plans haven't worked and I find myself unable to say "No" to new opportunities. Do not give scammers money or personal information – Ignore them!

How to avoid a scam:

- Remain calm. Talk to someone you trust.
- Hang up or ignore the message. DO NOT click on links or attachments.
- **Protect your money.** Criminals will insist that you pay in a hard-to-trace manner, such as with a gift card, prepaid debit card, cryptocurrency, wire transfer, money transfer, or by mailing cash.
- Protect your personal information. Be skeptical of a contact you didn't initiate.



In the spring of 2020, Lara's three daughters return to the family's orchard in Northern Michigan. While picking cherries, they beg their mother to tell them the story of Peter Duke, a famous actor with whom she shared both a stage and a romance years before at a theater company called Tom Lake. As Lara recalls the past, her daughters examine their own lives and relationship with their mother, and are forced to reconsider the world and everything they thought they knew.

Tom Lake is a meditation on youthful love, married love, and the lives parents have led before their children were born. Both hopeful and elegiac, it explores what it means to be happy even when the world is falling apart. As in all of her novels, Ann Patchett combines compelling narrative artistry with piercing insights into family dynamics. The result is a rich and luminous story, told with profound intelligence and emotional subtlety, that demonstrates once again why she is one of the most revered and acclaimed literary talents working today.

Great Decisions

Wednesdays beginning January 17, 2024 ending March 13, 2024 1:00 pm - 3:00 pm

The Mattapoisett Woman's Club Great Decisions Program has had a great six weeks so far. Recently we discussed Indonesia, and many of us realized that we knew very little about the country. The Foreign Policy Association 2024 Edition text refers to it as an "Invisible Indonesia." Ellen Stone, of Marion, a retired Interbank Foreign Exchange trader and a Global Treasury Management Consultant, started off the discussion with the history, the different ethnic groups, and the many religions: Christianity, Buddhism, Hinduism and Islam, the 2nd largest religion after Christianity. Ellen talked about how the military was always in politics and now with the New Order election on February 14th, with President-elect Prabowo Subianto, we will see if he makes good on his campaign promises of continuity with the current administration.

Our continued discussion was lively and upbeat with a lot of enthusiasm for a positive future, unlike some of our previous discussions which at times seem to be not too positive, especially finding that 43% of the world population gets their news from TikTok! U.S. intellectual Property has been stolen by China, and Taiwan is under constant threat from China. We have found that climate change may be the cause of half of the world's coral reefs disappearing. Immigration and refugee displacement is a direct result of climate change. "Whales, dolphins, porpoises and sea lions all suffer from bycatch from global fishing."

The next topic we will discuss is the High Seas Treaty, with a former Great Decisions member, Brad Smith, retired captain of the Coast Guard.
