MISSION STATEMENT PASSES AT MARCH LUNCHEON MEETING

In the fall of 1941, just months before Pearl Harbor was bombed and the United States was drawn into WWII, 75 women organized the Mattapoisett Woman's Club and signed their original charter. To best reflect their purpose and goals of the Club, the women chose the objectives of Civic, Social, Education and Philanthropic.

The Mattapoisett Woman's Club has been a robust and active group ever since with an average of 100 members over the past 84 years. This fall, 2024, the Executive Board called for an ad-hoc committee to review the objectives and for a mission statement to be drawn up as a way to better articulate the organization's principles and what it strives to achieve, serving as a guiding light for decision-making and a unifying energy for its members.

In October, a committee began to meet weekly to accomplish this, going back to the board in November and December for discussion and revision of its emerging mission statement and goals. The membership was included in this process at the Club's January and February meetings.

On March 20, 2025, history was created again at the monthly meeting, with votes cast to accept the Mission Statement by 63 votes to 3! In this way, we strengthen the purpose and goals of the Club and honor those visionary founding women in 1941, who endeavored to create an organization that would make a difference in the lives of our community's women.

To offer entertaining activities and educational programs to encourage lifelong learning.

Community Outreach:

To work in the community to build relationships, cultivate participation, access, equality and joy.

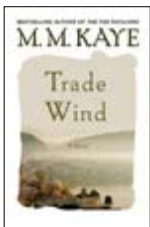
Literature Group

Great Decisions

Our final meeting of the Mattapoissett Woman's Club 2025 Great Decisions program found our group expressing renewed strength through the eyes of our guest speaker, Charlotte Van Voorhis, Community Engagement Manager of Envision Resilience, Corp., since 2023. A Yale graduate with a B.A. in American Studies and Sociolinguistics, she is currently pursuing her master's degree in English at Middlebury's Bread Loaf School of English.



Each year Charlotte assembles the local advisory committee to help match university teams of student architects with local experts for their designs.

In March 2024 several of our group attended the "Envision Resilience Exhibition: designs for Living and Rising Seas", held at the New Bedford Art Museum sponsored by "Remain Nantucket," a philanthropic organization that partners with city planners and design teams of student architects, institutions, and universities to help face climate challenges. The Exhibition featured "proposals of student designs demonstrating how infrastructure, housing, neighborhoods, and shorelines might be altered to cope with the ongoing challenges presented by climate change."

Having Charlotte discuss our chapter on International Cooperation on Climate Change and explore what it means for a resilient future in urban and coastal communities brought us the assurance of hope with a bright future.

Mama Mahina's Chinese Chicken Salad

As served at the MWC meeting on March 20, 2025

Ingredients:

- 1 whole shredded roasted chicken cooked by your favorite local store
- 1 head of Napa cabbage - sliced crosswise
- 1 bunch green onions - chopped
- 1 bunch fresh cilantro - leaves only, chopped
- 1-2 shredded carrots

Topping:

- 1 package of slivered almonds
- 1 tsp. sesame oil
- 1 package somen or ramen noodles – smashed (use a rolling pin or meat tenderizer to crush the noodles in the package)

Brown the noodles and the almonds mixed with 1 tsp. of sesame oil in a very large frying pan. The noodles brown more slowly than the almonds, so after a couple of minutes, mix the almonds in. The browning moves quickly. I start the noodles on high and then drop the heat to medium, stirring constantly.

Save the seasoning packet for the dressing.

Dressing: (Make 1-2 days ahead and refrigerate)

- 1/2 C. rice vinegar
- 1/2 C. canola oil
- 1 tsp. sesame oil
- 3 TBSP oyster sauce
- 3 TBSP sugar (I added another tsp. of sugar)
- salt & pepper to taste - probably 1/2 tsp. salt and 1/3 tsp. pepper
- 1 packet of seasoning from the Ramen noodles

Before tossing the salad, I add half of the noodle mix to the ingredients and then the dressing. Toss. Before serving, I top the salad with the rest of the almonds and noodles.
